Willamette Chapter Meetings



Upcoming Meeting Wednesday, January 8, 2025 Speaker: Keith White Topic: Plant Expeditions to China

While attending medical school and family medicine specialty residency in Portland, Keith frequently visited Crystal Springs Rhododendron Garden. The beauty of flowers and the stature of the plants was addicting. While working for the US Forest Service in the summers, between fires, he took advantage of the opportunity to I.D. the wildflowers in and around the woods in the Detroit Ranger District and in the Columbia Gorge. When working for the US Public Health Service in SE Alaska there were lots of hikes, some through bogs called "muskegs", where Alaska wildflowers were abundant.


Visiting Crystal Springs Rhododendron Garden Article and Photos by Ali Sarlak




